Tony Avent, Raleigh, NC "<u>The World of Hostas,</u> <u>Past and Present</u>", "<u>Perennial Favorites</u>"



Tony Avent, owner of Plant Delights Nursery founded this nursery to help fund the activities of Juniper Level Botanic Gardens, a display and research garden with over 11,000 plants. A graduate of North Carolina State University, Tony's horticulture professor instilled in him the quest for the newest and best garden plants from around the world.

Tony is well known as a lecturer, garden writer and recipient of prestigious awards from the American Horticultural Society, the North American Rock Garden Society, and the North Carolina Association of Nurserymen, to name a few.

Tony actually began selling plants when he was a young kid, so selling plants as an adult seemed natural to him. He quickly realized that starting a nursery was the best way to cover the costs of plant addiction without having to get a real job.

"Nurseries are for people who want to be in a business that embraces gardening, [and] enriches peoples' lives, while controlling their own destinies ... as much as Mother Nature will allow."

Tony Avent runs his nursery, Plant Delights, together with his wife, Michelle.



Gordon Hayward
Putney, Vermont,
"The Use of Stone
in the Garden",
"Placing Art in the
Garden"

In 1971, Gordon Hayward graduated from Wesleyan University with a Masters Degree, having already begun a 17 year career teaching high school students how to write. Gordon gardened part-time for personal clients during those years and in 1977 restored the gardens around the Broadwell Manor House in The Cotswold Hills in England. For the past 20 years he and his wife Mary, (who is from the Cotswolds) have been developing a one and one-half acre garden around their 220 year old cape here in southern Vermont.

In 1984, Gordon turned to the work of garden design, lecturing and writing full time. He consults across the country for residential clients, their architects and builders. Hayward has written nine books and over 50 articles for Horticulture Magazine and Fine Gardening Magazine that relate to this work.

Hayward is a proponent of the entry garden, wide borders flanking a front walk that serves as the garden's spine. "I want you to walk through and experience the front garden rather than pass it by," he says.

COMMUNITY GARDEN—ST. PAUL LUTHERAN CHURCH 3790 West Water Street Port Huron, MI 2011 REPORT

This was the third year for our Community Garden. It turned out to be very productive even though we had a late start due to excessive rainfall in May and then some flooding in June after it was planted.

The hot summer helped it catch up to where it should have been. I did a soil test again this year and the PH of the soil was right on the mark after last year's application of lime. In 2010 we had an excellent growing season and donated 2800 pounds of produce to Mid-City Nutrition (our local soup kitchen). This year we donated **over 4300 pounds** to Mid-City Nutrition.

There were 2 parts to the garden. On one part we rented out 10'X10' plots for a deposit of \$10.00 per participant. If a participant wanted more than 1 plot they could have more than one. We rented out a total of 44 plots to a total of 20 participants. If the participant took care of their plot(s) and cleaned it up at the end of the season, their \$10.00 deposit was returned. Some participants requested that their deposit be kept and donated to Mid-City Nutrition.

We had a total of 16 people who helped with the garden this year. We can always use additional help next year. If you are interested in helping, please let me know.

The total garden size was .43 of an acre. The other part of the garden was used to produce vegetables for Mid-City Nutrition (our local soup kitchen). The garden was very productive this year and we were able to donate over 4300 pounds of produce to Mid-City.

We had a large assortment of garden produce consisting of green beans, beets, cabbage, sweet corn, cucumbers, eggplant, lettuce, muskmelon, onions, green peppers, and potatoes, several types of squash, tomatoes, turnips and watermelon. Some things did better than others, but overall it was a very successful year.

This year we were fortunate and thankful to have received a **\$400.00** grant from Thrivent Financial for Lutherans which covered about half the cost of the garden.
